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Study Tour On Statistical Modernization from Pakistan to Mexico June 16-20, 2025

Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) is striving for strengthening the National Statistical System (NSS). The NSS is a critical framework for coordinating and integrating statistical activities to ensure the production of reliable, timely, and high-quality data for informed decision-making, policy formulation, and tracking development goals. PBS has already developed the National Strategy for the Development of Statistics (NSDS) 2021–2030, and a mid-term review of this strategy is essential to incorporate technological innovations, international best practices, and register-based census methodology as recommended by the Census Advisory Committee and approved by the CCI.

In order to strengthen the National Statistical System and for enhancing the capacities of PBS in line with International Best practices PBS conducted study tour of National Institute of Statistics and Geography (INEGI), Mexico w.e.f. 16th to 20th June, 2025 with support of the World Bank. The study visit aimed to explore key areas such as institutional coordination, technological innovation, data integration, state-level strategies, transparency, and the effective use of data in policy making. The focus was be on learning from Mexico's

pathfinder projects and innovative practices in statistical data collection, management, and dissemination—providing insights directly relevant to PBS's operational challenges and future strategies.



Key officials from the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS), including the Chief Statistician, Member (SS/IT) and DDG (PCS/PSLM)—who played pivotal roles in formulating the National Strategy for the Development of Statistics (NSDS)—participated in this visit to ensure continuity and relevance of the learning outcomes along with Joint Secretary and Section Officer from M/O PD&SI. The tour provided an opportunity to learn from Mexico's National Statistical System, particularly in the context of its federal governance structures, enhancing PBS's capacity to



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strengthen Pakistan's National Statistical System.

Conclusion and Benefits of the Mexico Study Tour for PBS



The study tour to Mexico, provided invaluable insights into the operational aspects of Mexico's National Statistical System (NSS), particularly within its federal governance framework and detailed mechanism of collection of Population Census, National Account, Industry and Economic Statistics data. This exposure enabled the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) to observe firsthand the integration of statistical activities across various levels of government, fostering a cohesive approach to data collection, management, and dissemination.

- 1. Institutional Coordination:** The tour highlighted effective mechanisms for coordinating statistical efforts between federal and state entities, ensuring consistency and reliability in data outputs.

Strategic Implications for PBS:

The knowledge and experiences gained from the study tour are instrumental in aligning PBS's operations with international best practices. By implementing the lessons learned, PBS can enhance the effectiveness of Pakistan's National Strategy for the Development of Statistics (NSDS), ensuring that it meets the evolving demands of data users and contributes to informed policymaking. Furthermore, the tour reinforced the importance of continuous capacity building and international collaboration in strengthening national statistical systems.





Regional Training Workshop on SEEA Asset Accounts at Japan 16-19 June, 2025

The System of Environmental Economic Accounting (SEEA) provides the internationally agreed statistical framework for measuring the relationship between the environment and the economy. It is comprised of two complimentary international statistical standards: the SEEA Central Framework (SEEA CF) and the SEEA Ecosystem Accounting (SEEA EA). The SEEA CF takes a resource-based approach to measuring the supply and use of resources and availability of environmental assets. The SEEA EA takes a more holistic approach in providing a spatially explicit approach to compiling accounts on ecosystems. The SEEA can be flexibly implemented by countries prioritizing accounts based on availability of information and policy priorities. The accounts are designed to respond to data needs for multiple policy initiatives including global initiatives on sustainable development goals (SDGs), on mitigating and adapting to climate change, disaster related statistics and on measuring the contribution of the environment to well-being. The accounts are also a necessary input to the compilation of headline indicators such as net domestic product as part of the recently adopted 2025 System of

National Accounts (SNA).

In Asia, good progress has been made in the compilation of SEEA accounts with many countries regularly compiling SEEA CF accounts. National statistical offices (NSOs) of countries in the region continue to express strong interest in compiling SEEA accounts, including taking steps towards compiling asset accounts which are relevant for informing the relationship between the economy and the environment.

With the recent adoption of the 2025 SNA which has expanded its asset boundary to include several natural resources assets of the SEEA CF, demands for environmental asset accounts will increase as the SEEA CF can provide input data for the compilation of the 2025 SNA. More broadly, there is a need to strengthen the capacities of NSOs to produce and disseminate SEEA accounts to better meet the needs of users for high quality integrated data on the contribution of the environment to the economy and the impact of the economy on the environment. Countries in the region are also well placed to substantively contribute to the update of the SEEA CF considering the experience gained in implementing the SEEA accounts.



External Trade Statistics

Exports from Pakistan

According to the provisional figures compiled by the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics, exports from Pakistan during June 2025 amounted to Rs. 701,121 million (provisional), as compared to Rs. 752,392 million in May 2025 and Rs. 712,281 million during June 2024, reflecting a decline of 6.81% over May 2025 and a decrease of 1.57% over June 2024.

On a cumulative basis, exports during the period July-June 2024-25 stood at Rs. 8,947,911 million (provisional) as against Rs. 8,674,104 million recorded in the corresponding period of the previous year, thereby showing a notable increase of 3.16%. This upward trend in annual exports indicates a steady improvement in trade performance despite monthly fluctuations.

Imports from Pakistan

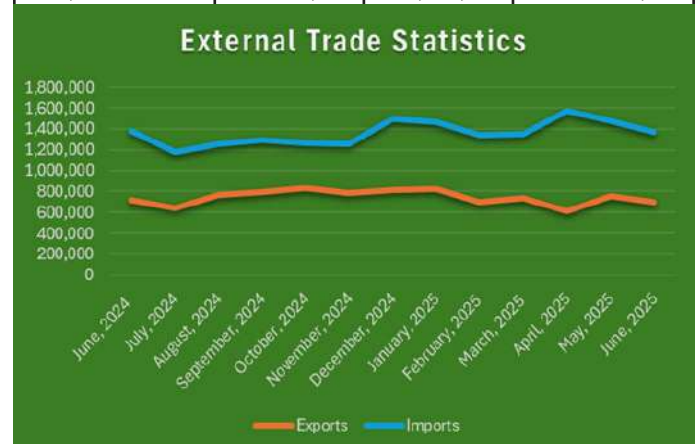
Imports into Pakistan during June 2025 amounted to Rs. 1,378,645 million (provisional), as compared with Rs. 1,475,181 million in May 2025 and Rs. 1,382,232 million in June 2024. This reflects a significant decline of 6.54% when compared with May 2025, and a marginal decrease of 0.26% as against June 2024, indicating that import activity has slightly contracted on a monthly as well as yearly basis.

On a cumulative level, imports during the period July-June 2024-25 totaled Rs. 16,313,233 million (provisional), compared to Rs. 15,482,120 million during the corresponding period of last year, showing a notable

overall increase of 5.37%. This rise points towards higher dependency on foreign goods and raw materials to meet domestic demand, industrial requirements, and energy needs. Despite the month-to-month fluctuations, the annual growth trend in imports underscores the continuing role of international trade in supporting Pakistan's production and consumption patterns.

The main commodities imported in June 2025 included petroleum group & products, machinery, transport equipment, chemicals, food items, and textile-related raw materials. These categories reflect the critical nature of imports for fueling energy, infrastructure development, industrial expansion, and meeting local consumption requirements. 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PBS Achieves Milestone with Successful Completion of First-Ever Digital HIES 2024-25 Field Operations

The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has successfully completed the field operations for the country's first-ever digital Household Integrated Economic Survey (HIES) 2024-25 on June 30, 2025. The nationwide exercise, covering all provinces along with Azad Jammu & Kashmir (AJK) and Gilgit-Baltistan (GB), marks a historic shift towards modern and technology-driven data collection in Pakistan.

This pioneering survey, conducted through digital tools integrated with Geographic Information System (GIS) mapping, represents a significant milestone in strengthening the quality, timeliness, and efficiency of socio-economic data collection. By eliminating the challenges of manual surveys, the digital approach ensures greater accuracy, transparency, and faster availability of data for evidence-based policy planning.

Officials at PBS hailed the achievement as a "landmark in Pakistan's statistical development," noting that the transition from traditional to digital surveys would not only enhance credibility but also enable policymakers to design more effective socio-economic interventions.

The successful completion of field operations under HIES 2024-25 reflects PBS's commitment to adopting global best practices in data collection, thereby aligning Pakistan with international standards in statistical systems.

PBS Progresses Towards Completion of Data Cleaning and Analysis for HIES 2024-25

The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has made significant headway in the data cleaning and analysis phase of the ongoing Household Integrated Economic Survey (HIES) 2024-25, ensuring the accuracy and credibility of national socio-economic statistics.

Regular internal meetings with staff and officers are being conducted to review challenges, discuss solutions, and implement necessary rectifications. Supervisors are closely monitoring their teams, while queries are addressed and updated daily at the Data Processing Center, reflecting PBS's commitment to transparency and quality assurance.

According to PBS, data cleaning for Quarters I, II, and III has been successfully completed, while the process for Quarter IV is currently in progress. Meanwhile, data analysis is already underway, transforming raw data into reliable insights that will serve as the foundation for evidence-based policymaking and socio-economic planning in Pakistan.

Officials highlighted that this systematic and technology-driven approach not only improves efficiency but also strengthens Pakistan's alignment with international best practices in statistical reporting.

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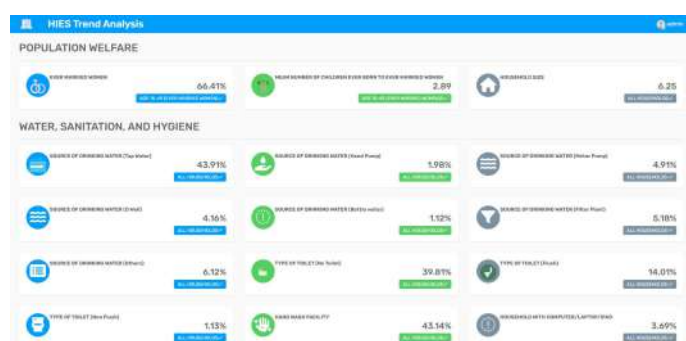

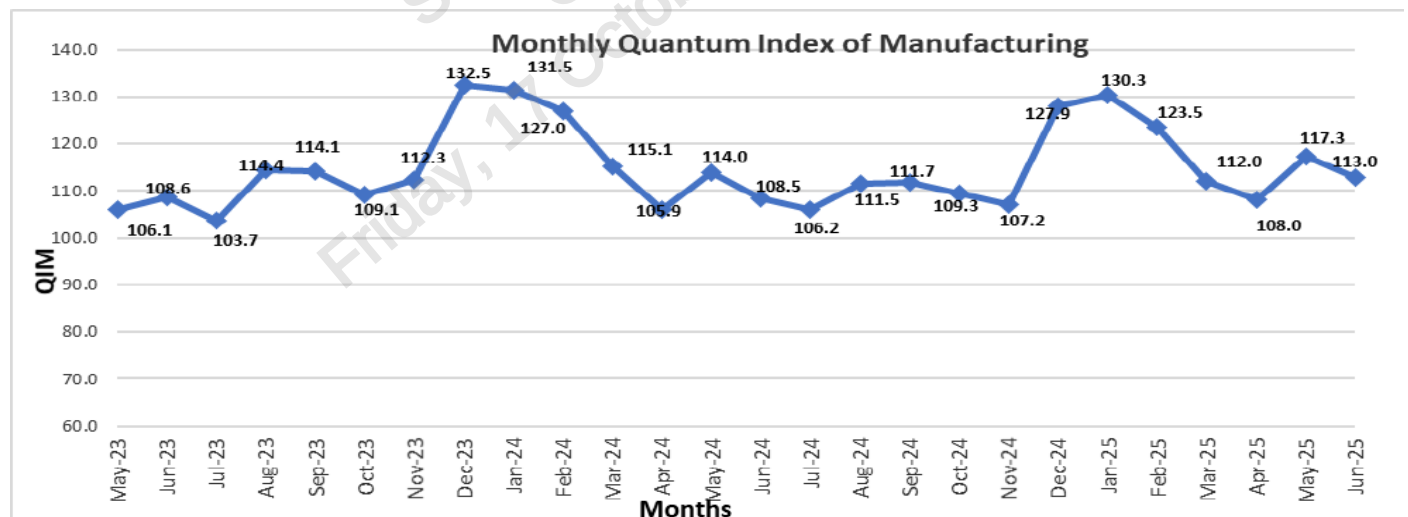
- QIM estimated for May, 2025 is 116.58

The production in July-May 2024-25 as compared to July-May 2023-24 has increased in Tobacco, Textile, wearing apparel, Coke & Petroleum Products, Automobiles and Other Transport Equipment while it Decreased in Food, Chemical Products, Non Metallic Mineral Products, Iron & Steel Products, Electrical Equipment, Machinery and Equipment, and Furniture.



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PBS Launches Groundbreaking Labour Force Survey 2024-25 with Focus on Gig Economy

The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) is making significant strides in reshaping the understanding of Pakistan's labor market through the Labour Force Survey (LFS) 2024-25, which marks the 37th round of this flagship national exercise since its inception in 1963. Unlike earlier rounds, the current survey is being conducted on a quarterly basis for the very first time, an approach that ensures labor market information is not only more timely and relevant but also directly feeds into the preparation of quarterly GDP estimates. This shift represents a landmark achievement in modernizing the country's statistical system and aligning it more closely with global best practices in data collection and dissemination.

A defining innovation of the 2024-25 round is the pioneering inclusion of the Gig Economy, a rapidly expanding segment of work characterized by short-term contracts, freelance services, and employment facilitated through digital platforms. With millions of Pakistanis increasingly turning towards app-based transportation, food delivery, and online freelancing services, this addition to the survey is both timely and critical. By capturing comprehensive information on gig work, Pakistan joins a group of countries that are actively reshaping their labor force statistics to reflect emerging global employment trends. This will enable policymakers, economists, development partners, and businesses to access credible and structured data about a sector that is already shaping the future of work worldwide.

Field operations for the survey are progressing smoothly and systematically across the country, covering all provinces as well as the regions of Azad Jammu & Kashmir (AJK) and Gilgit-Baltistan (GB). Enumeration for Quarters I, II, and III has already been successfully completed, while the draft report for the first quarter has been prepared, presented, and is currently under review by the Chief Statistician for feedback and technical refinement. Work on the draft of the second quarter is in progress and expected to be finalized in the coming weeks. Meanwhile, enumeration for the fourth quarter is ongoing, after which data processing, analysis, and report writing will begin in earnest.

PBS has confirmed that the final consolidated annual report, which will integrate findings from all four quarters into a single comprehensive document, is scheduled for completion by the end of August 2025. This landmark

report will provide an in-depth and holistic analysis of Pakistan's labor force dynamics, covering employment and unemployment trends, sectoral composition, youth and gender participation, urban-rural disparities, regional variations, and the growing contribution of the gig economy.

Officials have emphasized that the introduction of a quarterly framework, combined with the innovative expansion of coverage to new forms of employment, represents a major leap forward in statistical innovation. The LFS 2024-25 will not only strengthen evidence-based policymaking but also offer critical insights for human resource development, skill-building programs, gender empowerment, and inclusive growth strategies. Experts further believe that the results will be particularly valuable in identifying opportunities within non-traditional forms of work, which are gaining momentum in Pakistan's rapidly evolving labor market.

By capturing both traditional employment structures and emerging gig-based occupations, the LFS 2024-25 is set to become a cornerstone for future labor market planning. Its findings will help the government, private sector, and international stakeholders design more targeted interventions for sustainable employment, social protection, and robust economic growth, ultimately fostering a labor market that is more dynamic, resilient, and inclusive.





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CEO Punjab Social Protection Authority Visits PBS GIS Lab

The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) hosted a delegation led by Mr. Ali Shahzad, CEO of the Punjab Social Protection Authority (PSPA), at its GIS Lab in Islamabad. The visit highlighted the importance of strengthening federal-provincial collaboration to harness data for evidence-based planning and inclusive development.



During the session, Member (SS/RM) highlighted the remarkable progress made by PBS in the development of the Digital Area Frame, a breakthrough innovation aimed at improving the accuracy of official statistics and ensuring efficient resource allocation across the country and shared valuable insights into PBS's role at the national level during the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly its efforts in providing real-time services and data support to policymakers and also briefed on the collection & use of Points of Interest (POIs) during the landmark Population Census.

Khawaja Asif Majeed, DPO (Incharge), gave a detailed overview of the internal functioning of the GIS Section. He explained the systematic development of the Area Frame and outlined the modern methodologies adopted by the GIS Lab to enhance the use of spatial data in policymaking, urban planning, and resource management.

The visit not only provided the PSPA delegation with a first-hand understanding of PBS's digital innovations but also laid the foundation for future cooperation in areas such as social protection, poverty alleviation, and evidence-based planning.

PBS officials noted that the collaboration with provincial stakeholders such as PSPA reflects the bureau's commitment to modern statistical tools, ensuring that data-driven solutions play a central role in driving inclusive social policies in Pakistan.

The session marked an important step in the launch of the operational phase of SMEs surveys under the CBNA/SMEDA initiative.

The official inaugural ceremony marking the commencement of kick start of field work of CBNA/SMEDA Surveys on Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) was held in Lahore. The event was formally inaugurated by Muhammad Sarwar Gondal (S.I), Member (SS/RM), Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS), who launched the nationwide initiative aimed at comprehensively assessing the SME sector across the country.

This landmark event signifies the beginning of a strategic effort to gather data and insights that will inform policy formulation, enhance institutional support mechanisms, and promote the growth and development of SMEs in Pakistan. The CBNA/SMEDA surveys are designed to evaluate the current landscape, operational challenges, and capacity-building requirements of SMEs operating in various sectors and regions in Pakistan. In his address, the Member (SS/RM) highlighted the pivotal role of SMEs in Pakistan's economic fabric, contributing significantly to employment generation, innovation, and industrial development. He emphasized the importance



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of evidence-based policymaking and reiterated PBS's commitment to providing high-quality data for national planning and decision-making.

Subsequently, the fieldwork phase was launched on **27th May 2025** and continued until **15th June 2025**. The data collected through the CBNA/SMEDA surveys is expected to play a critical role in shaping future interventions for SME development, aligning with national economic goals and contributing to sustainable growth.

A series of Progress Review Meetings for the CBNA/

SMEDA Surveys on Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) were convened under the chairmanship of the Chief Statistician and Member (SS/RM), Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS). These meetings were a critical part of the oversight mechanism to ensure the timely and effective implementation of the ongoing Phase-I of the national surveys on SMEs.



The meetings brought together focal persons, technical experts, and field management teams to assess the status of field operations, address implementation challenges, and reinforce quality assurance protocols.

The Member (SS/RM) reiterated PBS's commitment to maintaining high standards in data quality, confidentiality, and methodological rigor, noting that the insights generated from the CBNA/SMEDA surveys would form a critical evidence base for SME policy and development planning.

These review meetings served as a platform for coordination, knowledge sharing, and troubleshooting, reinforcing the collaborative efforts between PBS, SMEDA, and other stakeholders to ensure the successful execution of this high-priority national initiative.

Orientation Session of Phase-II SMEs Survey:

In line with the Government of Pakistan's strategic vision to promote SME-led economic growth, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has launched field operations for SME-focused Other Private Services Surveys (OPSS) in Phase-II. These surveys are being conducted under the Change of Base Year of National Accounts (CBNA) in collaboration with the Small and Medium Enterprises Development Authority (SMEDA).

An orientation session for master trainers was





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successfully held on June 17th, 2025, at PBS Headquarters, Islamabad. The session aimed to equip trainers with the necessary technical knowledge and field guidelines. Nationwide training sessions were subsequently conducted from June 23rd to 25th, 2025 covering the Other Private Sectors (OPS) of the economy.

During the orientation, SMEDA experts presented the Baseline Questionnaire and elaborated on key definitions and sectoral classifications, enhancing participants' understanding of the survey scope. These OPS surveys represent a significant milestone in strengthening data-driven policy, generating employment insights, and supporting sustainable economic development across Pakistan.



Training and Field Activities of Phase-II SMEs Surveys:

Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) initiated Phase-II training for five SMEs surveys under the Change of Base of National Accounts (CBNA) in collaboration with SMEDA. The three-day training sessions were conducted from 23rd to 25th June 2025, held simultaneously at PBS Headquarters, Islamabad, and seven regional offices: Quetta, Gilgit-Baltistan, Peshawar, Karachi, Hyderabad, Lahore, and Multan.

Pakistan Bureau of Statistics successfully carried out field operations from 27th June to 15th July 2025 under Phase-II of SMEs surveys. Data collection was conducted across five key sectors, ensuring broad national coverage. Enumerators worked diligently in the field, maintaining quality and accuracy in data gathering.

Inflation Situation in Pakistan (April – June 2025)

The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS), as the country's National Statistical Office (NSO), is entrusted with the responsibility of collecting, compiling, and disseminating official statistics on wholesale and retail prices to measure inflation across Pakistan. These statistics serve as a critical input for evidence-based policymaking, economic planning, and monitoring the cost of living.

To capture a comprehensive picture of price movements, PBS regularly computes the following indicators:

- **National Consumer Price Index (NCPI)** – providing an overall measure of consumer inflation at the national level.
- **Urban Consumer Price Index (UCPI)** – measuring inflation in urban centers.
- **Rural Consumer Price Index (RPI)** – reflecting price changes in rural areas.
- **Wholesale Price Index (WPI)** – covering wholesale markets and trends in traded goods.
- **Sensitive Price Indicator (SPI)** – compiled weekly to monitor short-term price changes in essential commodities.

To ensure transparency and timely dissemination, PBS publishes a Monthly Review on Price Indices along with the Weekly SPI Report. Both are regularly uploaded

on the PBS official website (www.pbs.gov.pk), making them accessible to government institutions, researchers, businesses, and the general public. These reports play a vital role in evaluating inflationary pressures, guiding fiscal and monetary policy, and assisting households in understanding price movements that directly impact their daily expenditures.

For the quarter April – June 2025, PBS has compiled and analyzed detailed data on inflationary trends. The results are presented in the following tables:

- **Table 1: Monthly Inflationary Situation (Apr–Jun 2025)**
- **Table 2: Core Inflation (Apr–Jun 2025)**
- **Table 3: Quarterly Inflationary Trends (Apr–Jun 2025)**

These tables not only provide a breakdown of headline inflation but also distinguish between urban and rural dynamics, offering a clearer picture of how price changes affect different population groups. The quarterly analysis further highlights underlying trends, including movements in core inflation, which excludes volatile food and energy prices.

PBS officials noted that such detailed monitoring enables policymakers to take timely corrective measures while supporting long-term strategies for stabilizing the economy and protecting vulnerable segments of society from inflationary shocks.

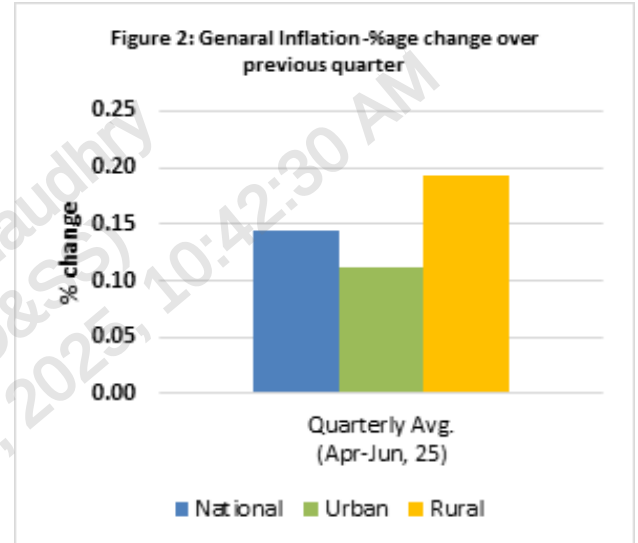

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113th Meeting of National Accounts Committee (NAC) Highlights Pakistan's Economic Landscape: From Crops to Services, Data-Driven Growth Unfolds.

The 113th meeting of the National Accounts Committee (NAC) was convened at the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) Headquarters, chaired by Mr. Awais Manzur Sumra.

The high-level session brought together representatives from the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP), Ministry of Finance, Pakistan Institute of Development Economics (PIDE), and other key institutions to comprehensively review Pakistan's national accounts. The meeting served as a vital platform to evaluate both quarterly and annual estimates, offering valuable insights into the country's economic health and growth trajectory.

recovery despite sector-specific challenges, highlighting the importance of timely data in monitoring the economy's short-term performance.

Annual GDP Estimates

In addition to quarterly results, the committee assessed broader annual indicators:

- FY 2022–23 final GDP: -0.21%, capturing the slowdown in economic activity during that period.
- FY 2023–24 revised GDP: 2.51%, showing moderate recovery.
- FY 2024–25 provisional GDP: 2.68%, pointing towards modest yet consistent growth, supported by mixed sectoral contributions.



Quarterly Performance Review:

The committee deliberated on the updated Gross Value Added (GVA) estimates for the first three quarters of FY 2024-25:

- Q1: Growth stood at 1.37%, mainly due to improvements in "other crops" production.
- Q2: Registered 1.53%, reflecting a slight downward revision, primarily linked to weaker performance in the agriculture sector.
- Q3: Posted a steady 2.40%, signaling resilience and relative stability across multiple sectors.

The quarterly review reflected Pakistan's gradual

Sectoral Insights

A sector-wise analysis revealed a diverse economic picture:

Agriculture: Witnessed a decline, largely due to reduced output in important crops. However, livestock, forestry, and fishing continued to record positive growth, cushioning the sector from sharper losses.

Industry: Displayed encouraging trends in certain sub-sectors, but large-scale manufacturing, small-scale manufacturing, and slaughtering reported contractions, limiting the sector's overall contribution.

Services: Emerged as a stabilizing factor, benefitting from steady performance across multiple components, thereby helping sustain GDP growth momentum.

Technical Clarifications and Discussions

An important aspect of the meeting was the in-depth technical dialogue between stakeholders. Experts



Pre-NAC Meeting Validates Agriculture and Forestry Data Ahead of National Accounts

In preparation for the finalization of the country's national accounts, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) organized a pre-National Accounts Committee (NAC) meeting focused on the agriculture and forestry sectors. The meeting was chaired by Dr. Naeem uz Zafar, Chief Statistician of PBS, and attended by experts from the Provincial Crop Reporting Services (CRS) and the Space & Upper Atmosphere Research Commission (SUPARCO).

The session aimed at validating estimates of Kharif and Rabi crops, along with data from the forestry sector, ensuring the credibility and accuracy of agricultural statistics before their integration into the national accounts. While SUPARCO representatives attended the meeting in person, designated CRS officials from all provinces joined virtually through Zoom, reflecting PBS's commitment to nationwide collaboration and inclusivity.

During the deliberations, participants identified a mismatch between fodder crop production and livestock population figures in Sindh Province. Recognizing the significance of accurate data for livestock and fodder—critical components of Pakistan's rural economy—the committee unanimously decided that CRS Punjab will conduct a specialized training workshop at PBS Headquarters, Islamabad. This workshop will focus on explaining and harmonizing the fodder estimation methodology, with participation from all CRS units across provinces, including Azad Jammu & Kashmir (AJK) and Gilgit-Baltistan (GB). The meeting also underscored the importance of reliable data in the forestry sector. Stakeholders agreed to supply data on major forest products on a quarterly basis. This step will not only strengthen the estimation of quarterly accounts but also provide policymakers with timely insights into a sector that contributes significantly to sustainable development and environmental management.

The Chief Statistician appreciated the active participation of CRS and SUPARCO representatives, noting that pre-NAC meetings play a vital role in strengthening the reliability of Pakistan's national accounts. By validating sectoral data in advance, PBS ensures that the country's economic indicators accurately reflect ground realities, thereby supporting evidence-based decision-making, effective resource allocation, and robust policy formulation. The meeting concluded with consensus on continued cooperation and data-sharing among federal, provincial, and technical institutions.

raised queries on:

- Methodological consistency in sectoral estimates.
- Alignment with external forecasts, particularly comparisons with IMF projections.
- Treatment of subsidies in GVA calculations, especially electricity subsidies.
- Quarterly crop estimation practices and potential refinements.
- Consistency of trade and import data, a recurring area of concern.

PBS representatives provided detailed explanations, reinforcing the transparency and robustness of the statistical methodology. They also highlighted ongoing efforts to further strengthen data collection, improve accuracy, and align estimation practices with international statistical standards.

Building Confidence in National Accounts

By the conclusion of the meeting, participants expressed satisfaction with the clarifications and data validation process. Members collectively reaffirmed their confidence in PBS's role as the custodian of Pakistan's official statistics, recognizing its commitment to delivering credible, timely, and evidence-based data for effective policy formulation.

Consensus for the Future

The session closed on a note of consensus and optimism, with participants acknowledging the indispensable role of reliable national accounts in shaping Pakistan's macroeconomic strategy and long-term growth path. By ensuring methodological transparency and strengthening stakeholder engagement, PBS continues to play a pivotal role in guiding national economic planning and fostering data-driven decision-making.



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Pakistan set to Launch Groundbreaking 7th Population & Housing Census-2023 (Digital Census) Reports

In a landmark development for evidence-based policymaking, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has successfully finalized the National Census Report (NCR) of Pakistan, the Provincial Census Reports (PCRs) of Punjab, Sindh, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and Balochistan, along with the District Census Report (DCR) of Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) under the Digital Census-2023 initiative.

This achievement comes after months of extensive planning, data compilation, and coordinated efforts by PBS in close collaboration with relevant provincial and federal stakeholders. The reports have now received approval from the competent authority, paving the way for their official unveiling in a high-profile ceremony.

The launch ceremony, to be held in Islamabad, will be chaired by the Federal Minister for Planning, Development & Special Initiatives (PD&SI), who will not only release the reports but also inaugurate the Digital Census Dashboard – a modern tool that will provide real-time access to census data for policymakers, researchers, and the general public. This marks a historic shift towards digital governance and data transparency in Pakistan.

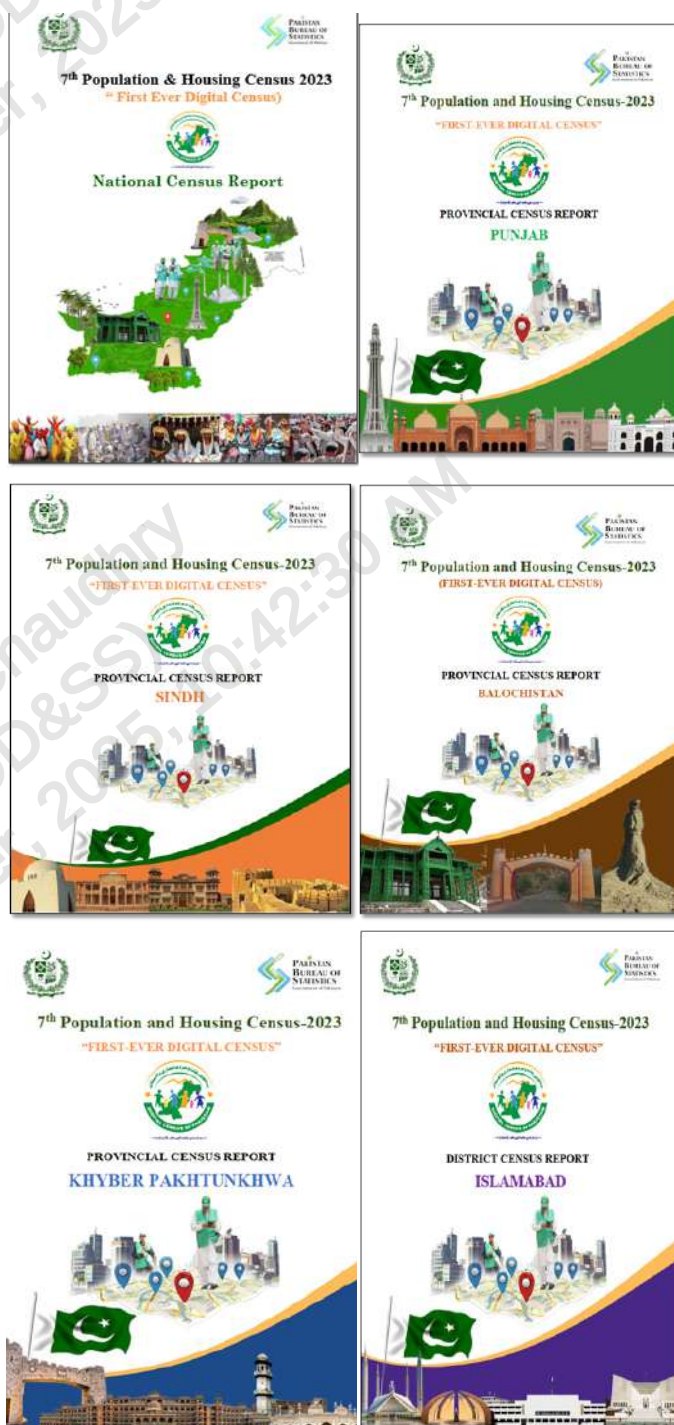
To ensure accessibility, PBS has initiated the printing of 300 copies of the National Census Report (NCR), 150 copies each of the Provincial Census Reports (PCRs), and 150 copies of the ICT District Census Report (DCR). These will be distributed to government institutions, universities, think tanks, international organizations, and other stakeholders to strengthen data-driven decision-making across sectors including education, health, infrastructure, and social development.

At the same time, PBS is also working diligently on the preparation of Reports for Azad Jammu & Kashmir (AJK), Gilgit-Baltistan (GB), and detailed District Census Reports for all provinces, which are currently in progress and expected to be finalized in the coming months. This comprehensive coverage will ensure that no region is left behind in terms of census representation and statistical inclusion.

Officials highlighted that the Digital Census-2023 is the first-ever digital population and housing census in Pakistan's history, making it a milestone achievement in the country's statistical and governance landscape. Unlike previous censuses, this digital approach has allowed for greater accuracy, efficiency, and transparency in data collection, validation, and reporting.

Experts believe that the publication of these reports will serve as a cornerstone for national planning, governance reforms, and long-term development strategies. Reliable census data will enable policymakers to better allocate resources, plan infrastructure, address social challenges, and design targeted policies that meet the needs of a rapidly growing population.

With the official launch just around the corner, the Digital Census-2023 reports are set to become a defining tool for Pakistan's development journey, shaping decisions that will impact millions of lives in the years ahead.

PBS Advances Fund Reconciliation for Pakistan's First-Ever Digital Census 2023

The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has reported significant progress in reconciling funds for Pakistan's first-ever Digital Population and Housing Census-2023, ensuring transparency and financial accountability.

Out of funds released to 157 districts for vehicles, training, and staff remuneration, adjustments of Rs. 3,402.187 million have already been made, while Rs. 341.171 million remain outstanding from 21 districts. An additional Rs. 390.302 million has been returned as unspent balance.

PBS confirmed that funds for training and staff remuneration have been fully reconciled with the AGPR, Islamabad. Expenditure reports from most districts have been received, with only a few pending. The Bureau reiterated its commitment to complete the process, highlighting that this exercise sets new benchmarks for financial discipline and accountability in national projects.

Officials noted that the successful completion of this exercise will not only reinforce confidence in the Digital Census-2023 as a landmark achievement but also set

new standards for fiscal responsibility in future national projects.

- Finalization of the MMEs Questionnaire to capture detailed operational data.
- Preparation of a training manual for standardized understanding.
- Testing of tablet-based survey applications for efficient data collection.
- The survey will be conducted in both urban and rural areas, covering medium-scale manufacturing enterprises. Its key objectives include:
 - Generating data on activities (seasonal/non-seasonal), inputs, outputs, and workforce size.
 - Estimating value added by medium enterprises in manufacturing.
 - Providing a data foundation for planning, policymaking, and research.

Officials noted that this will deliver Pakistan's first-ever comprehensive data on medium enterprises, along missing link in national statistics. By filling this gap, PBS and SMEDA aim to empower policymakers, researchers, and industry stakeholders with insights to spur growth, foster innovation, and strengthen resilience in Pakistan's SME sector.

This initiative underscores the government's commitment to using data for development, ensuring SMEs continue to thrive as a pillar of economic progress.



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PBS Initiates 12 SMEDA Surveys to Boost Evidence-Based SME Policy

In line with the directives of the Prime Minister of Pakistan, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has launched an ambitious program of 12 specialized surveys for the Small and Medium Enterprises Development Authority (SMEDA). The initiative aims to strengthen evidence-based policy planning in the SME sector, a backbone of Pakistan's economy.

This landmark effort is being undertaken in three strategic phases as part of the Change of Base of National Accounts (CBNA) program, which focuses on modernizing statistical systems to reflect the true dynamics of the national economy.

Phase I: Successful Completion of Four Key Surveys

PBS has successfully completed the first phase of the CBNA/SMEDA program, covering four important economic sectors:

- Inland Fishing and Aquaculture
- Raising of Poultry
- Legal and Accounting Activities
- Management Consultancy, Advertising, Market Research, and Travel Agencies

These sectors were prioritized due to their growing contribution to the national economy and the need for updated, reliable data to guide policy decisions.

Nationwide Training for Field Staff

- To ensure high-quality data collection, PBS organized a comprehensive training program for 154 field enumerators across the country.
- Master Trainers (MTs) were trained at PBS Headquarters, Islamabad, on May 22, 2025.
- A two-day training session (May 23–24, 2025) was conducted simultaneously at key PBS Regional Offices in Lahore, Karachi, Peshawar, Quetta, Gilgit, and Islamabad.

The training program featured:

- Expert sessions by subject specialists on survey concepts and tools
- Hands-on practice with tablet-based applications for block mapping and field boundary handling
- Pre- and post-assessment tests to evaluate participant learning outcomes
- Continuous supervision by PBS senior management to maintain quality standards

The training concluded with a formal closing

ceremony in Lahore, chaired by Member (SS/RM), where representatives from SMEDA also participated and commended PBS's efforts in modernizing data collection practices.

Moving Ahead

With Phase I successfully completed, PBS is now preparing to roll out subsequent phases of the 12-sector survey program. These surveys will provide timely and credible statistics, supporting SMEDA and policymakers in formulating strategies to enhance productivity, promote entrepreneurship, and strengthen Pakistan's SME ecosystem.





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CBNA – Phase II: Expansion to Five More Private Sector Surveys

Building on the success of Phase I, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has advanced to Phase II of the Change of Base of National Accounts (CBNA) program, widening its coverage to include five additional private sector services under the SMEDA initiative. These surveys target some of the most dynamic and high-growth areas of Pakistan's economy:

- Private Sector Education
- Human Health and Social Work Activities (Private)
- Accommodation and Food Services Activities
- Publishing and Software Development
- Other Personal Activities
- Nationwide Training & Survey Launch

To ensure smooth implementation, an orientation session was organized at PBS Headquarters, Islamabad, followed by the formal inauguration of Phase II by the Chief Statistician during a ceremony at PBS Lahore. The event was attended by SMEDA representatives and sector stakeholders, highlighting strong collaboration between statistical and policy institutions.

Pakistan bureau of Statistics (PBS) has scheduled the Training program for these surveys. From June 23–25, 2025, a large-scale training program was rolled out across eight regional venues, where 256 field staff members were trained in modern survey tools and methodologies. The venues included:

- PBS Lahore
- PBS Multan
- PBS Karachi
- PBS Hyderabad
- PBS Peshawar
- PBS Quetta
- Field Office Gilgit
- PBS HQ Islamabad (including participants from AJ&K and Rawalpindi)

The training sessions featured expert guidance, tablet-based practice for digital data collection, and monitoring by senior management to uphold quality standards.

Commencement of Field Operations

Immediately after training, field operations were launched nationwide, ensuring that data collection began

without delay. This proactive approach reflects PBS's commitment to timeliness, reliability, and policy relevance in statistical reporting.

Commitment to SMEs

Through Phases I and II of the CBNA/SMEDA surveys, PBS has demonstrated to provide credible, evidence-based data that will guide policymaking for Pakistan's Small and Medium Enterprise (SME) sector. These efforts will play a vital role in strengthening the national economy, encouraging entrepreneurship, and enabling sustainable development.





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Historic Milestone Achieved: Pakistan Completes 7th Agricultural Census 2024 Through Integrated Digital Count.

The Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) has proudly accomplished a landmark achievement with the successful completion of the 7th Agricultural Census 2024, introducing for the first time in Pakistan's history the Integrated Digital Count (IDC) approach. This modern methodology has transformed the census process by ensuring greater accuracy, speed, efficiency, and transparency, setting a new standard for statistical operations in the country.

The Agricultural Census holds immense national importance as it provides the foundation for data-driven decision-making in the agriculture and livestock sectors, sectors that remain the backbone of Pakistan's economy, contributing nearly 24% to the GDP and providing livelihoods to 38% of the labor force. By shifting to a fully digitalized system, PBS has not only modernized the process but also ensured the provision of authentic, credible, and timely data to policymakers and stakeholders.

Progress and Ongoing Activities

The significant progress was made in data cleaning and analysis following the successful field operations completed in the previous quarter. Multiple high-level in-house meetings, chaired by Member (SS/RM), were held to review quality control mechanisms, streamline verification processes, and adopt effective strategies for maintaining the highest standards of reliability. Officers from PBS's subject-matter divisions and IT support teams worked in close collaboration, reflecting strong institutional synergy and dedication to ensuring the integrity of census data.

Towards Evidence-Based Policy

Simultaneously, preparations are underway for the Key Findings Report of the 7th Agricultural Census 2024. This flagship report, scheduled for launch by the end of July 2025, will present major insights, emerging trends, and analytical results gathered from the census. It will serve as a comprehensive reference document for policymakers, researchers, development partners, and other stakeholders, guiding the design of policies and initiatives for agricultural growth, food security, rural

development, and poverty reduction.

A New Era of Agricultural Statistics

The adoption of the Integrated Digital Count in the Agricultural Census reflects PBS's commitment to innovation, modernization, and international best practices. It demonstrates how technology can revolutionize data collection processes and support evidence-based governance. The census findings are expected to help in strengthening institutional capacity, enhancing productivity, and addressing challenges faced by farmers and the broader agricultural community.

The successful completion of the 7th Agricultural



Census 2024 is not just a statistical exercise but a historic milestone in Pakistan's development journey. It symbolizes the country's transition towards digital transformation and highlights the government's resolve to empower the agriculture sector "the true lifeline of the nation".
